

LAID-BACK BREASTFEEDING

Also called Biological NurturingTM

- A unique way of feeding that is based on the natural breastfeeding instincts in mother and baby.
- It is achieved through comfortable positioning of mother in a laid-back position.
- Baby is positioned on top of mother and is supported mainly by gravity

- Mom and baby can be skin-to-skin, or lightly dressed, whatever is most comfortable.
- Mom leans back (<u>not</u> flat on her back) on couch, large chair or bed, using pillows to support her upper body. This creates a more open surface on mom for close contact with baby.
- Baby is placed on top of mom front to front. Baby's head is somewhere near the mom's bare breast, body is vertical or leaning to one side or the other.
- Baby's legs can brush against mom's lower abdomen or upper thighs, or mom can support the bottom of baby's feet with her palms.
- Baby cuddles and curls around mom's body curves. Both mom and baby relax so natural hormones and reflexes enhance breastfeeding.
- Mom can use her hands and arms to help baby as much as she wants. Given time, most babies selfattach.
- Moms need to be careful not to fall asleep in this position as this can be unsafe for baby.
